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# FROM THE CO-PASTORS

*Dear Friends,*

May you spend some time beneath the stars with your children in the coming days. May you talk of Genesis, science, beauty, and the mysteries that God will always keep. May you store up the connections and memories of these nights for all the years to come. Maybe you could write a prayer together, a prayer like this one written one night beneath the stars years ago.

## A LOVE THAT TRANSCENDS TWEETS

If you think you can reach us, don't blame yourselves when you fail. It's not your fault. We have changed dramatically since your halcyon days; and our values, attitudes and expectations are wildly different than yours. Don't let the costumes of our baggy pants or the awkward gait lull you into complacency. We are smart and our methods for navigating the world are far beyond your ability to comprehend. Resistance is futile.

We were socialized into a world of accelerating change. We do not know who Mick Jagger is; we have no clue who the Soviets are. Starbucks always has been on every corner. Atari predates us as do vinyl albums.

We are unbelievably adept at technology. We know you know this, but don't even try to keep up because we'll leave you in the haze of our digitized dust. We were born with a mouse in our hand. You wrote love notes on paper during third grade; we text them on cell phones. You passed atoms in the classroom; we passed bits. You might often hear the buzzing of our world in the background of yours - some call it white noise, others cyberspace, some the computing cloud; but everyone knows it is there even if they can't quite place it.

Our information is organized across multiple channels.. Facebook, Twitter, My Space, iPads, Cell Phones...and constantly is updating or expanding. We see you as another channel from which we derive our information about your world - and your God. So there. Click.

We are wildly connected. Information and messages flow easily from one place to another; and we transport it with us on really cool, miniaturized hand-held devices. Our

knowledge isn't housed in physical libraries, relegated to the confines of the classroom or accessed solely in church buildings and programs. I know you won't want to hear this, but you aren't the primary source of our knowledge on a subject, even if that subject is Jesus. You are just one tool among many, adding a bit of value to the overall linkage of our intelligence and spirituality.

We are a swarming, heaving hive of connectional nodes and interactions. We are an ethnically heterogeneous group of consumers who are confident in our ability to read anything, buy anything, and experience anything. We have been so commercially indulged since our inception that the first words out of most of our mouths were not "Mama" or "Dada" but "Coke" and McDonalds." We are bonded to brands. By age 10, we were visiting stores 270 times per year. It doesn't mean we're proud of that fact; deep down in the places we are less and less capable of accessing, we know there has to be more. Much more.

So if you decide to reach us, help us access that deepest place that not even technology or the market can penetrate. Don't package spiritual products for us to consume. Embody Christ in ways that are tangible and enduring. Love us from the core of your being. The more relationally significant you want to be, the less technology you should use to communicate to us. Use your vocal chords and tear ducts. If you want to create a piece-meal Christ that speaks to us on a perfunctory level, use all the technological tools and gizmos at your disposal. We'll hear about Christ, sure; but we won't truly know him

## WOMEN'S WEDNESDAY EVENING BOOK STUDY RESUMES JANUARY 19 - FEBRUARY 23

Join us on Wednesday evenings at 7:00 p.m. as we read Marcus Borg's new novel: *Putting Away Childish Things: A Tale of Modern Faith*. Borg says that he decided to use fiction as a way of giving readers more of a sense of how people struggle with religious ideas in everyday life. In the book we meet Kate—a popular religion professor at a liberal arts college in a small midwestern town who thinks her life is right on track. Kate is up for tenure when it all starts to go wrong. A colleague warns her that her books are too Christian and too popular. She is offered a visiting professor job at a prestigious seminary, which sounds like the perfect solution except for one complication—it is the same seminary that employs the professor she had an affair

with years ago. Kate now has to face her past and watch as the ramifications unfold in ways she never imagined. In the classroom, students ask for her views on Jesus, the Bible, and homosexuality, controversial topics that Kate candidly addresses until outraged parents start campaigning for the school to get rid of her. Through it all, Kate faces the toughest challenge yet—a crisis of faith that leaves her questioning what she believed so strongly before.

### EXPLORING FUNDAMENTALISMS WITH DR. DAVID VALETA

Beginning Jan 30, this 6 week class will explore the phenomenon of Fundamentalism in Religious Traditions. The class will use the framework provided by Charles Kimball in his book, *When Religion Becomes Evil: Five Warning Signs*. We will explore the following topics:

### MORE ON THE ART OF PARENTING WITH CAROLYN AJIE

This fall we discussed the joys and challenges of raising our children. The series will continue to look at parenting in greater depth and with some new topics and materials. The Art of Parenting was developed because we all benefit from having a variety of tools to apply as our family grows and changes. The Art of Parenting workshops take a different approach from the typical parenting class and don't presume to teach you to be a parent.

The workshops offer you tested information and provide a place to explore alternatives that are appropriate for your family. As parents, you have experience and insight to offer each other and these workshops are designed to allow for time for discussion and some practice. While these are not lectures, you will get plenty of written material and other resources to take home with you.

Art of Parenting workshops are appropriate for parents with children of all ages, but perhaps are most useful for pre-school through elementary ages (2-12). Although it is not necessary to attend all the workshops, there are themes that carry through the series as well as benefits gained from establishing relationships with other participating parents.

- What does being a parent really mean to you?
- Basic Needs, Developmental Stages and Temperament
- Power Struggles: Win, Lose or Draw?
- Identifying and Using Your Strengths
- Consequences and Reinforcement Strategies and Techniques
- Stress and the Healthy Family: It's a Balancing Act

## MONTVIEW QUILTERS

Montview Quilters are excited about our new endeavor. We are very busy sewing every Monday morning (at the church) to provide handmade quilts for residents at Brent's Place.

Brent's Place makes a difference in the lives of children with cancer and their families by providing housing close to Children's Hospital/Anschutz Medical Campus. There is a second facility (the original) close to Presbyterian St Luke's Hospital. Children with cancer, following a bone marrow or stem cell transplant have special needs in terms of housing. In particular, they need to be protected from common bacteria and molds as well as limit their exposure to other people and infection as they recover. Brent's Place is the only place in the Rocky Mountain region that provides this "safe clean" housing. There are 16 apartments for kids with cancer and their families. The apartments are thoroughly cleaned three times a week to maintain the "safe clean" status. The cancer patients who are immune suppressed because of medical treatment

requires that they remain under close supervision of caregivers/doctors while they heal. Brent's Place provides such a setting. The average stay for children and their families is fifty-two days.

Montview Quilters became involved with Brent's Place just recently and we have already given twelve quilts for the children to use while at Brent's Place and then to bring home when their doctors discharge them. Brent's Place welcomes a new family approximately every two weeks so we are very busy sewing the quilts. We have found this endeavor to be extremely rewarding. We feel blessed to be able to provide some comfort to these children and families during such a stressful time.

With this in mind, any donation of fabric or anything else to Montview Quilters would be greatly appreciated. A few of us had the privilege of touring the facility recently and we were very impressed with what Brent's Place offers to these children and their families.
